#### Vintage Cocktail Corner

#### The Sazerac

Mardi Gras (Fat Tuesday) is over for this year, but unless you gave up drinking for Lent you can still enjoy the official cocktail of New Orleans, *The Sagerac*.

This drink is thought to date from about 1850 and takes its name from Sazerac de Forge et Fils Cognac Brandy, a brand imported at that time. Legend says the drink was first served by local apothecary, Antoine Amédée Peychaud, who mixed his proprietary bitters with cognac as a medicine, but this is probably just a story. It is more likely that the drink originated in the Sazerac Coffee House, owned by Aaron Bird, where it became a very popular house cocktail. In 1895 they even bottled it.

Time has seen variations in the recipe. In the 1870s Rye Whiskey became widely used due to a shortage of Cognac. Today Cognac and Rye are both popular. The Sazerac first appeared in print in 1908 but that recipe called for Selner Bitters (no longer made) rather than Peychaud's. When Absinth became illegal in the US in 1912, various anise-flavored liquors were substituted.

#### To make:

Pour a very small amount of Absinth into a chilled cocktail glass. Turn and tip the glass to coat the inside and then discard any excess.

Stir together with ice:

- 1-1/2 oz Rye Whiskey or Cognac
- 1 teaspoon simple syrup (or sugar)
- 3 dashes Peychaud's Bitters

Strain the drink into the prepared glass.

Garnish with a lemon twist.

Note: If you don't have Peychaud's Bitters you can substitute Angostura Bitters; it will still taste good but it won't really be a Sazerac.


