
SCHIELE SUBDIVISION BLOCK PARTY

Vintage Cocktail Corner

The Hot Toddy

People have probably been mixing spirits with hot water to drive off the cold since long before anybody thought about writing down a recipe, but the "Hot Toddy" became popular in the 18th century, particularly in cold climates. The name "Toddy" seems to have come from the Hindi word *Taddy*, which referred to a beverage made from fermented palm sap. By the mid 18th century the word had evolved to mean a cold beverage made with spirits, water, sugar and spices, and was popular with Britons in India who took the name home.

In the pubs of chilly Edinburgh, Scotland, a drink of whiskey and hot water became popular in the 18th century and eventually acquired the name "Hot Toddy." In time people started adding sugar or honey and sometimes spices such as nutmeg or cinnamon. In the New World rum was the readily available spirit, and rum-based hot toddies became a wintertime favorite in the colonies of New England, sometimes with added egg yolks.

Interestingly, 19th century bartender guides have more recipes for cold toddies, simply spirits mixed with sugar, maybe some water, and ice; a hot toddy simply substitutes hot water, perhaps adding a grate of nutmeg. A recipe that appears in nearly every early bar guide is the Hot Apple Toddy, made with either brandy or apple jack with half a baked apple placed in the glass.


Here is a simple recipe, easy to vary to suit your taste.

Hot Toddy

2 ounces rum, whiskey, or brandy ½ teaspoon sugar (or to taste) Scrape of nutmeg and/or lemon peel (optional) Hot water

Put the spirits and sugar in a mug, fill with hot water and stir. Scrape some nutmeg on top and add lemon peel if desired.
