Within 2 years, his wages had increased to \$20 an hour.

Later, Debbie's mom spotted an ad in the classified section of the Palo Alto Times for a hardwood business for sale. Pete ended up purchasing the business from the 89-year old owner for \$7600 and changed the name from John's One-Stop Service to Pete's Floors. The business included a drum sander, edger, miter saw, trim saw, two vacuum cleaners and a 1962 Dodge van. Calls from John's customers were forwarded to the new business for 2 weeks and Pete was able to get many jobs in the Palo Alto area. Debbie helped by answering the phone, scheduling estimates and jobs, and assisting with all the paperwork.

Some of the special jobs Pete had the opportunity to work on over the years includes the Gamble House in Pasadena, the Thorsen House and the Hillside Club in Berkeley, and the Winchester Mystery House and San Jose Woman's Club in San Jose.

So come out for the chance to see their beautiful home, a wonderful presentation, and time spent with friends. Of course, as always there will be wine, water and snacks. See you there!

HISTORY OF THE VPA WEBSITE

Back in 1995 while working for a company called Domain Technologies, I started hearing about this new thing called the World Wide Web. I remember back then it was hard to get started because you had to download the software as it wasn't loaded as part of the OS as it is now. But how do you download it from the Internet when you don't have the software? Kind of a catch-22.



I eventually figured it out, using my 5400 baud dial up modem I made a connection to a bulletin board and downloaded the software.

Once I got on the World Wide Web (or the Internet as we call it today) I found there was a ton of free information available, on almost any topic you were interested. I decided to see what I could do to add back to this community and the VPA website was born.

I started compiling a list of all the historic house museums open in the U.S., mainly using the AAA Tour Books as my source. Everything was written in HTML, coding an individual page for each of the fifty states plus Washington D.C.

Eventually, as more and more museums went online, links and photos were added. The vpa.org site went through a number of redesigns, first in 1997 as my HTML coding skills and tools improved, then in 2000 I designed a database to start entering the info in, to make it easier to maintain, and it allowed users to submit new entries as well.



2006 saw a new color scheme and design, borrowing elements from the Bradbury & Bradbury catalog. In 2010 the site was moved into WordPress, to make the editing easier, as well as to make the design more flexible. People were starting to use their phones to connect to the Internet, and that opened up a whole new set of problems.

In 2015, I once again redesigned the site, and when I found time, I continued the conversion from HTML directory pages to database driven pages.

I was just finishing up that process in late 2022 when the WordPress theme I was using was no longer being supported. I started on yet another redesign, but then found that so many of the URLs for the museums had changed that a complete review of the site was warranted.

I spent most of my free time in November and December going through the 1200 entries I had accumulated, checking each one to make sure the link still worked, and to find a good photo of the museum.




All this data was then ported into a new database structure so that I could retire the custom PHP code I had written for the site. I'm an old dog, and I'm getting tired of learning new tricks, so I found an application I could use rather than rewriting everything myself. *continued on p. 4.*

I just made my goal of completing everything and launched the new site New Year's Eve, just before we lost power while staying with friends in Salinas.

It's hard to believe that by some standards, our website is now an antique itself, having been around for over 25 years. In that time we've gone from IBM PC's with an 800x600 monitor, to iPhones, iPads, and desktop computers with multiple monitors, with resolutions up to 8 times higher than what was available in 1996.



These screenshots are all from archive.org, a website that has been archiving the Internet from the beginning. It is an invaluable resource for looking back at our recent history.

As a group that loves living in the past, it's nice to know that our digital history is being preserved just as our historic houses are.



The Vieux Carré Cocktail

In honor of Mardi Gras, here is a classic New Orleans cocktail. (If you want another, see last March's issue of the VPA Newsletter for The Sazerac, official cocktail of New Orleans.)

The *Vieux Carré* (vyur kaa ray) is a simple stirred cocktail but it has more ingredients than most. It includes the French herbal liqueur *Bénédictine* and New Orleans' own Peychaud's Bitters. There is no substitute for either of these ingredients—leaving them out creates a variation on the Manhattan, but still tasty.

The drink was created in the early 1930s by Walter Bergeron, head bartender at the Hotel Monteleone in New Orleans. He created it to do honor to the city's famed *Vieux Carré* (AKA French Quarter). It remains a signature cocktail of that hotel's famous Carousel Bar.

3/4 ounce rye whiskey
3/4 ounce cognac
3/4 ounce sweet vermouth
1 to 2 dashes Angostura Bitters
1 to 2 dashes Peychaud's Bitters
1 teaspoon Bénédictine liqueur
Lemon twist

Stir all ingredients with ice and strain into a cocktail glass or serv on-the-rocks. Garnish with a lemon twist.


