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## Tour of Roberto Adobe and Suñol House

770 Lincoln Avenue, San José, California. Saturday, May 20, 1:00pm

This month we will tour one of the oldest homes in San Jose. Be aware that their parking lot can fit about eight cars and there may be others present as they are open to the public. Parking along Lincoln can be tight, but if you don't mind walking a bit, try Paula St. on the other side of Lincoln. There is also a CEFCU just on the other side of 280 with a large parking lot shared by two churches. I doubt anybody would object to us parking there on a Saturday.

Here is a brief history of the property edited from the California Pioneer's website:

The Roberto Adobe was built by Native American Roberto Balermino in about 1836. It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. In 1847, Antonio Suñol built the brick Suñol House adjoining the adobe. Suñol owned San José's first store and held many prominent positions in the city. In 1853, a Dalmation sea captain named Stefano Splivalo purchased the Suñol house. He added the second story, encased the brick walls in wood siding, and added the three eastern rooms. This treasure was nearly lost when I-280 was constructed but was saved due to the work of local preservationists.

We will dive into more of the history of this property with docents from The California Pioneers of Santa Clara County who now own the site and operate it as a museum. After the tour let's all travel a few blocks on Lincoln for drinks and snacks. We can go south to **Jakes** for pizza, burgers, beer etc. or north to **Hapa's Brewing** for house-made craft beer and whatever food truck they may have. Chromatic Coffee is in the same complex if that's the brew for you. We can decide which after the tour.
