

Vintage Cocktail Corner

Wassail!

Wassail! Wassail! All over the town,
Our toast it is white and our ale it is brown;
Our bowl it is made of the white maple tree;
With the wassailing bowl, we'll drink unto thee.

The lines above are from one of the many wassailing songs from across England. Wassail isn't really a cocktail, but it is among the first popular mixed drinks. So as yuletide approaches, enjoy this winter warmer.

The word probably comes from Old Norse *ves heill*, meaning "good health" or "good fortune." The phrase was used as a toast, but at some point, in the early Middle Ages, it also became the name of the drink.

Early wassail was mead with roasted apples dropped in. As other ingredients became more available, the recipes evolved. Wine, ale, cider (apple or pear), honey, sugar, spices, exotic citrus fruits and sometimes brandy were used as available. Beaten eggs might be mixed in as well. Wassail was traditionally served hot, in a communal bowl, with pieces of toast floated on top. Today most people leave out the toast, but the word lives on as we raise our glasses.

In the cider-producing regions of England, the wassailing tradition involved a Twelfth Night procession to the orchards, singing and drinking to the health of the trees to ensure a good harvest the following season, while usually making a ruckus to drive away evil spirits. In some areas people would form processions from house to house to offer their blessings and songs and receive gifts and wassail.

Don't overthink wassail. It's hard to mess it up. Start with your beverage(s) of choice, add spices (cinnamon, cloves, ginger, allspice), maybe some sliced oranges or apples, and warm slowly over the stove. Add a touch of brandy for a bit of a kick. Sweeten to taste. Experiment with small amounts to find your perfect recipe or just make something as simple as spiced cider. (If you want a real recipe, the Internet has dozens.)
